

EVERY single piece of plastic that has ever been created since the 19th century is still SOMEWHERE on our planet. So if it never goes away, where does it go?

The invention of synthetic plastic created an era of disposable products. Watertight and endlessly malleable, plastic is the perfect invention yet, its miraculous durability is also its curse because it never goes away.

In the early 21st Century, rumors about an island of garbage somewhere in the Pacific Ocean, started to rise. TV host and filmmaker ANGELA SUN, decided to investigate. Her journey takes her thousands of miles from human civilization. There, in what should be a remote tropical paradise, she discovers an ecosystem inundated by plastic waste. Exposed to seawater and sunlight, tons of discarded plastics are breaking down into smaller fragments resembling food to fish and birds. The images Angela uncovers, combined with the latest evidence from researchers, shows that the truth behind the myth is much worse than imagined. A growing toxic confetti is transforming the oceans and is also working its way up the food chain that humans depend on. Angela returns from Midway with even more questions. She seeks out scientists and health experts who reveal that chemicals in many of the plastic products we take for granted are harmful. She encounters environmental activists trying to raise awareness and legislators struggling to address the problem. She uncovers the hidden truth about recycling and attempts to contact the leaders of an all–powerful petrochemical industry in control of our limitless production and consumption of plastic. Angela's journey is one that everyone living in a disposable society needs to see.

Award-winning television host/journalist Angela Sun's passion for storytelling and love for the oceans led to the creation of this ambitious project. A Bay Area Native, she is a graduate of UCLA and also studied abroad at the University of New South Wales in Sydney. Angela has conducted field research on the Great Barrier Reef while at UNSW, focusing on the study of reef sharks. A certified EcoDiver, she surveyed the coral reefs of the Andaman Sea as part of the Malibu Reef Check internship program. She serves on the board or advisors for Ocean Defender Hawaii. She has produced for MTV News, ProSeiben Network, and Current TV. As an on-camera host her diverse experience includes Fox Sports Net, ESPN, LXTV, Current TV, MTV, Tennis Channel, NBC's "American Ninja Warrior". She is currently a host for Yahoo! Director's Statement

I have always had a grand fascination and passionate curiosity for the oceans and everything in it, so this story was a natural progression for me. When a colleague and good friend of mine brought the Great Pacific Garbage Patch to my attention in 2006, I was immediately intrigued. After doing more research and learning that there was not much information about this topic I knew I had to tell this story. I was brought up in a household that used paper and plastic plates and cups during meals because it was more convenient. Trips to the McDonald's playgrounds and happy meals were staples on weekends. I loved adding my happy meal toy to the large collection of My Little Ponies and Polly Pockets, while my brother had his share of Legos, GI Joes, and Ninja Turtles.

Fast forward to 2009 when I finally made the trip out to Midway Atoll to explore this so-called "Great Pacific Garbage Patch". While walking through the visitor center filled with plastic artifacts, one piece in particular stood out to me. It was "Rocksteady" from the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles and I remember my brother used to play with it. I wondered, could this have been his? Washed ashore on this tiny atoll, thousands of miles away from where I grew up, this plastic figurine from the mid 1980s stood the test of time and weather and was now staring me in the face. I wondered the stories it could tell about its journey through the oceans currents to ultimately, in front of me 20 some years later. It was an eye opening experience of bittersweet nostalgia as I kept finding pieces of the past, and potentially MY past, all around this tiny speck of land in the middle of the vast ocean. From 35mm film caps, to a message in a bottle dated in 1999; It really brought this issue full circle for me. What we throw away, doesn't really ever go away.

But the story didn't stop there. I wanted to know the history of how we got to this point and how my trip to Midway was really going to affect me in my daily life. In making this film, we capture what is going on in some of the most remote parts of the earth and how mass consumption ultimately leads to this silent killer that is choking our ocean life and ultimately, ourselves. Rooted in a lot research and facts throughout many years, I hope that this film resonates with viewers and connects you with our world around us. We are all part of this story.




